



What is Sexual Assault?

Sexual assault is any type of sexual contact or behavior that occurs without the consent of the recipient. Sexual assault occurs when a person is forced, coerced, or manipulated into any unwanted sexual activity.



Types of Sexual Violence and Assault



Victim/Survivor/Target



Prevalence of Sexual Violence

More than **1in 3**

women experienced sexual violence involving physical contact during her lifetime.



Nearly 1in4

men experienced sexual violence involving physical contact during his lifetime.

Rape Culture



This is Rape Culture.

These are not isolated incidents. The attitudes and actions on the bottom tiers reinforce and excuse those on the upper. This is systematic.

> If this is to change, the culture must change. Start the conversation today.

Beyond Myths

Fact: Anyone can experience sexual violence—no matter their profession, gender, gender identity, sexual orientation, race, ethnicity, class, age, or ability.

Fact: Consent is a freely given, clearly stated "yes." Silence is not consent. Being drunk or drugged and unable to understand or speak is not consent. Being passed out or unconscious is not consent.

Fact: Previous sexual conduct, including previous consent to sex, is not consent for sex right now. If she kissed you yesterday, that doesn't mean she wants to kiss you today.

Fact: Rape is never the victim's fault. It is a crime of violence and control that stems from the perpetrator's determination to exercise power over another. Neither a person's clothing or behavior are invitations for unwanted sexual activity. Forcing someone to engage in non-consensual sexual activity is rape, regardless of the way that person dresses or acts.

Fact: A person under the influence of drugs or alcohol can't consent to sexual activity. If consent isn't given, it is rape.

Fact: Most rapes are committed by someone the victim knows. For both completed and attempted rapes, about 8 in 10 offenders were known to the victim. Rape can be committed within any type of relationship, including in marriage, in dating relationships, or by classmates, acquaintances or co-workers.



Consent

Ongoing

Anyone can change their mind about what they're interested in doing, anytime.

Freely given

Saying yes without pressure or manipulation.

Specific

Saying yes to one act (i.e. kissing) doesn't mean you've said yes to others (i.e. oral sex).



Informed


Not deceiving or lying. For example, if someone says they'll use a condom and then they don't, there isn't full consent.

Enthusiastic

It's about wanting to do something, not feeling like you have to or should do something.

Three L's of Response

- Learn—Learn about sexual violence, prevalence, and impact
- Listen—Listen to the survivor, don't judge, be someone that is supportive and believes them
- Link—Link the survivor to community resources



Learn about Sexual Violence

- Talk with experts (Rape crisis centers, CALCASA)
- Read information and fact sheets
- Ask questions




Listen to the Survivor

- Listen without planning out what your response is Be Present
- Don't interrupt
- Don't add your own experiences or make it about you
- Say: It is not your fault
- Say: What do you need? What do you want to do?


