



"Stay home, except as needed to maintain continuity of operations of essential critical infrastructure sectors and additional sectors as the State Public Health Officer may designate as critical."

If remote work is not practical:

- 1 of 3 lives in a household that makes less than \$40,000 a year.
- Millions of grocery-store workers and slaughterhouse employees and home health aides rely on food stamps.


Vulnerability

- Facing economic impacts
- Greater risk of harassment and workplace abuse
- More pressure to keep the job at any cost
- Increased risk of domestic and sexual violence at home
- Isolation

Consider the Intersections


"Within this new ecosystem, a 'racial justice paradox' has emerged: Blacks and Latinxs are more likely to be unemployed due to the impacts of the pandemic on the labor market, but they are also overrepresented among essential workers who must stay in their jobs, particularly lower-skilled positions, where they are at greater risk of exposure to the virus."


