

What is Child Sexual Abuse (CSA)?

Child sexual abuse is a form of child abuse that includes sexual activity with a minor. A child cannot consent to any form of sexual activity, period. When a perpetrator engages with a child this way, they are committing a crime that can have lasting effects on the victim for years. Child sexual abuse does not need to include physical contact between a perpetrator and a child.

CSA can include:

Exhibitionism, or exposing oneself to a minor

Fondling

Intercourse

Masturbation in the presence of a minor or forcing the minor to masturbate

Obscene phone calls, text messages, or digital interaction

Producing, owning, or sharing pornographic images or movies of children

Sex of any kind with a minor, including vaginal, oral, or anal

Sex trafficking

Any other sexual conduct that is harmful to a child's mental, emotional, or physical welfare



400,000 children are sexually abused each year.

That means 1 in 10 children faces the horror of sexual abuse.

- **90%** of victims are abused by someone they **know** and **trust**.
- > 60% are acquaintances like teachers, neighbors, or community leaders.
 > 30% are immediate or extended family.
 Only 10% are strangers to the child.

A reactive approach does not work.

Only 31% of children tell someone within the first year. Only 55% of reported incidents are investigated by CPS. Only 29% of reported incidents lead to police arrests. Many sexually abused children suffer **trauma** severe enough to negatively impact their adult lives. They're **3x more likely** to abuse **drugs** or **alcohol**, and **2x more likely** to **drop out** of school.

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



Warning Signs and Indicators

Emotional signs:

Anxiety and depression

Sleep disturbances, including nightmares or night terrors

Change in eating habits

Unusual fear of certain people or places; reluctance to be alone with a certain person

Changes in mood that could including anger, aggressiveness towards parents, siblings, friends, pets

Rebellion or withdrawal; runaway behavior

Change in attitude towards school or academic performance; lack of interest in friends, sports, or other activities

Unexplained or frequent health problems like headaches or stomach aches

Poor self-esteem; avoidance of relationships

Self-mutilation or change in body perception, like thinking of self or body as dirty or bad; suicidal thoughts

Regression to previously outgrown behaviors, for example, bedwetting or thumb sucking Abnormal sexual behaviors or knowledge of advanced sexual language and behaviors Too "perfect" behavior or overly compliant behavior



Warning Signs and Indicators

Physical signs:

Direct physical signs of sexual abuse are not common. However, when physical signs are present, they may include bruising, bleeding, redness and bumps, or scabs around the mouth, genital, or anus. Urinary tract infections, sexually transmitted diseases, and abnormal vaginal or penile discharge are also warning signs.

There are other indirect physical signs that include:

Persistent or recurring pain during urination or bowel movements

Wetting or soiling accidents unrelated to toilet training

Sexually transmitted diseases

Chronic stomach pain

Headaches

Child sexual abuse victims often exhibit indirect physical signs such as chronic stomach pain and headaches.

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
