



- Primary prevention




Community Grant: Changing Social Norms

Social norms: the unwritten rules of society

Primary goal: to increase capacity in campus communities to understand, and to act on, social norms change theory.



Community Grant: Changing Social Norms



Peer Education Program

Primary goal: use a peer-topeer model to spread violence prevention education to students across campus

Approach: Peer education is a valuable way to reach students. The program is pedagogically grounded in primary prevention and social



Peer Education Program

- Overview and research base; connection to SEM
- Structure and student application/participation process
- Examples of outreach and education done by peer eds
- Two or three take away points

Peer Education Program

Recruitment:

- Written application
- Interview
- Conduct check

Course:

- 2 units
- 1 semester
- Violence and trauma, prevention theory, education theory

Being a Peer Educator:

- Weekly meetings
- Hourly pay for about 5 hours a week
- Workshops and presentations, tabling, social media, events



In-department SVSH Training by and for Graduate Students


Primary goal: use the mandatory training for incoming students as an opportunity to build capacity within graduate programs to improve their climate as relates to SVSH.

Research: indicates that peers/members of intact communities are more impactful than outsiders.




