
What we know...

Violence is a Complex Public Health Issue



adults in California (8%) experienced **physical violence**.

adults in California (15%) experienced sexual violence.



What we know...

Latinx and Black Californians were more likely to have experienced physical violence in the past year, while Latinx Californians were more likely to have experienced sexual violence. **Lesbian, gay, and bisexual Californians** were more likely to have experienced sexual violence in the past year. This was true for all forms of sexual violence, including coercive, exploitative, and forced sex.

Californians with a history of homelessness were more than 2x as likely to have experienced violence in the past year. **Californians with a disability** were more than 2x as likely to have experienced violence in the past year.

1 in 3 Californians regularly experience discrimination. Those who do were 6x as likely to have experienced physical violence and 3x as likely to have experienced sexual violence. **Experiences of financial distress** in the past year—eviction and food or housing insecurity—are associated with a 2–8x increase in risk of physical violence, sexual violence, and IPV in California.








What are protective environments?

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Community Level Change








