VALOR Joins 1,500 Organizations Advocating for the Victims of Crime Act Funding

SACRAMENTO – VALOR joined 1,558 victim service organizations across the country to urge Congress to fund the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Federal grant program at \$1.9 billion beginning Fiscal Year 24-25. VOCA is the nation's funding source to supporting victims of crime ranging from sexual assault, domestic violence, human trafficking, child abuse, elder abuse, and so much more. VOCA funds allow programs to provide direct services that support survivors' healing and recovery journeys.

The stakes are high if Congress does not allocate \$1.9 billion in funding. Programs across the country are preparing for devastating cuts to their VOCA funds ranging anywhere between 30-40%.

"Supporting survivors of crime is a bipartisan issue. We need Congress to act urgently and fund VOCA at \$1.9 billion," shared VALOR's CEO, Sandra Henriquez.
